



## Barn Rising.

112" x 112".

A log cabin pattern. A Variation of the Barn Rising pattern, I found a photograph in Carol Ann Wien's log cabin book.

### Fabric required.

Blue - 7 yards.

Cream - 7" yards.

Pink - 1"yard.

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If you wish to enter a quilt show with a quilt / wall hanging from any of my patterns you must credit me with the design.









You may make a quilt / wall hanging from this pattern for your own personal use or as a gift for someone else there is no limit for how many you make in this category.

Wadding 120" x 120".




Backing 120" x 120".

### To make.

From the blue, cream and pink fabric cut some strips 1.25" wide, across the whole width of the fabric, normally 44". Use the following information to cut 13 pieces .

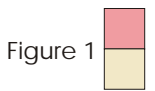
1		1.5" x 1.5".	5		1.5" x 3.5".
2		1.5" x 1.5".	6		1.5" x 3.5".
3		2.5" x 1.5".	7		1.5" x 4.5".
4		2.5" x 1.5".	8		1.5" x 4.5".



- 9  1.5" x 5.5"
- 10  1.5" x 5.5"
- 11  1.5" x 6.5"

- 12  1.5" x 6.5"
- 13  1.5" X 7.5"

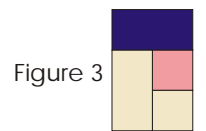
Take pieces 1 and 2 and sew them together, press the seam under the pink fabric. Figure 1.



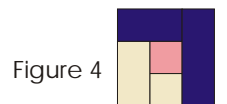
Have the pink fabric to the top and place piece 3 to the left of the two pieces in figure 1. Press the fabric under piece 3. Figure 2.

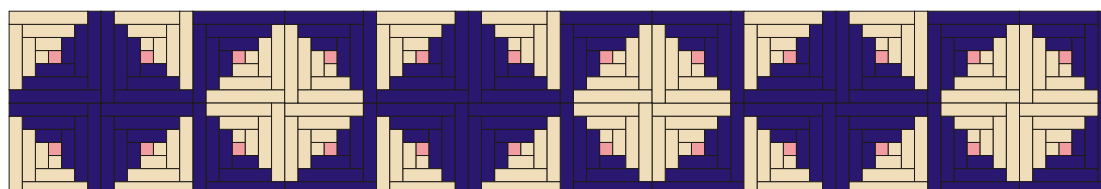


Figure 3 . unit 3.

Keep the pink fabric to the top and add piece 4 over the top of piece 3 and piece 1. Press the fabric under piece 4. Figure 3.



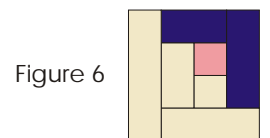

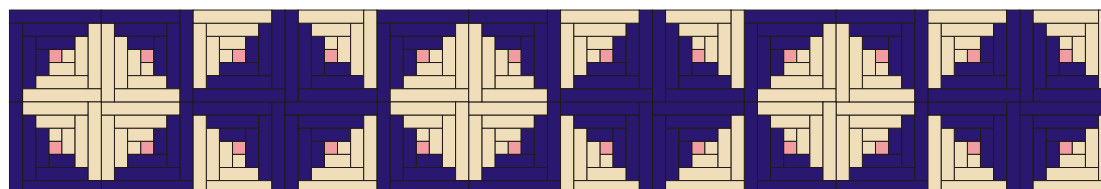


Figure 4. Unit 4.

To the right side of the block add piece 5, press the seam under the blue fabric. Figure 4.



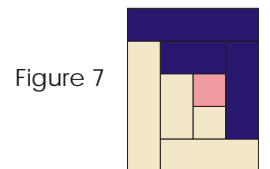

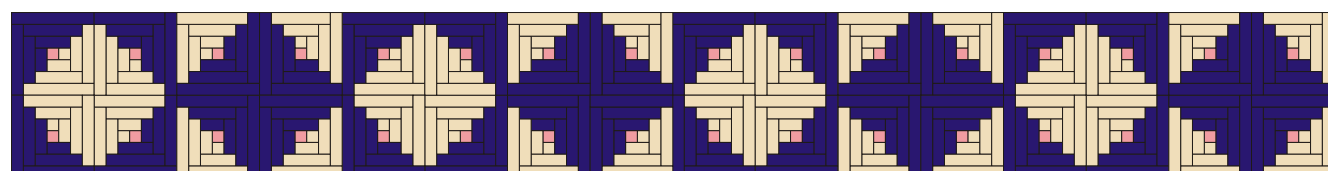
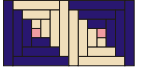


Figure 5. Unit 5.

Place piece 6 to the bottom of the block, keep pressing the seam under the new added piece of fabric. Figure 5.



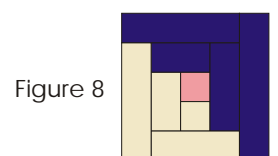
Add piece 7 to the left of the block. Figure 6.



Add piece 8 to the top of the block, figure 7.

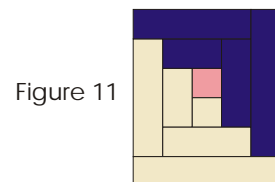


Add piece 9 to the right of the block, figure 8.

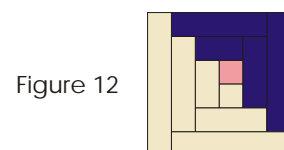




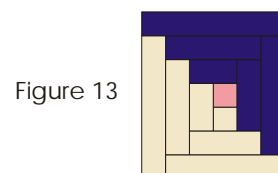
Add piece 10 to the bottom of the block, figure 11.



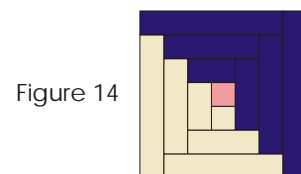
Add piece 11 to the left of the block, figure 12.



Add piece 12 to the top of the block, figure 13.



Add piece 13 to the right of the block, figure 14.



This completes the log cabin block. For this pattern you need 288.



You can make all the blocks needed or make them as you need them. Once you have some ready the following will show how to put the blocks together to make the quilt.

Take two of the blocks and place them together as shown in figure 1. The darker colours to the outside the lighter colours inside.

Do the same with two more blocks then join them together to make a square, unit 1. Make 14.

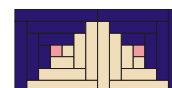
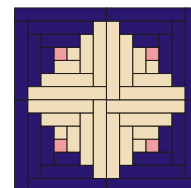

Do the same with four more blocks but this time have the lighter colours to the outside and the darker colours to the inside, unit 2, figure 2. Make 15.

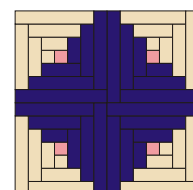

Unit 2

Take 3 of the unit 1's and 4 of the unit 2's, beginning with one of the unit 2's alternate the units and sew them into a row. Figure 3. Unit 3.

Take 4 of the unit 1's and 3 of the unit 2's. This time beginning with one of the unit 1's alternate the units and sew them together. Figure 4. Unit 4.

Take 4 unit 1's and 4 unit 2's beginning with one of the unit 1's and alternate the units and sew them together. Unit 5. Make two of these.

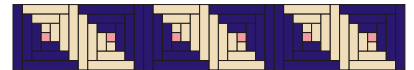
Take two of the log cabin blocks and sew the two together with the lighter fabric together and the dark to the outside. The lighter fabric makes a diagonal line that goes from the left to the right. Figure 6. Unit 6, Make 3.

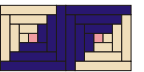
Sew the three units together, figure 7. Unit 7.

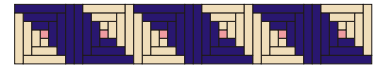
Take two of the log cabin blocks sew them together with the darker fabric together and the lighter fabric to the outside. The darker fabric makes a diagonal line that goes from the right to the left. Figure 8. Unit 8. Make 3.

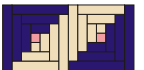
Sew the three unit 8's together to make unit 9. Figure 9. Make 3.

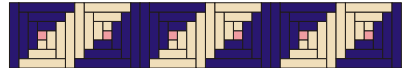
Sew two of the log cabin blocks together with the light fabric together the darker fabric to the outside. The diagonal line the lighter fabric makes goes from the right to the left. Figure 10. Unit 10. Make 3.

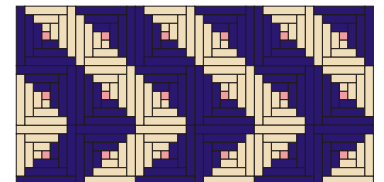
Sew the three unit 10's together to make unit 11. Figure 11. Make 2.

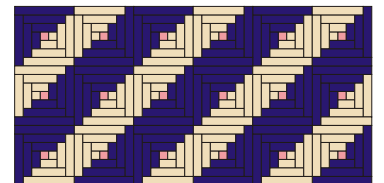
Take one of the unit 7's and sew the unit 9 to the bottom of it. Take a second unit 9 and turn it 180 degrees and add to the bottom the first unit 9. Figure 12, unit 12. Make 2.

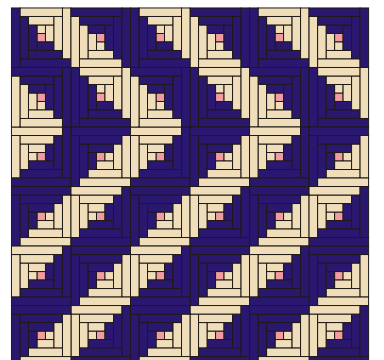
Take one of the unit 9 turn this round 180 degrees and sew a unit 11 to the top. Add the second unit 11 to the bottom of the unit 9. Figure 13. Unit 13. Make 2.

Add the unit 12 to the top of unit 13. Unit 14. Figure 14. Make 2.

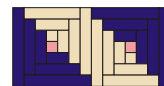

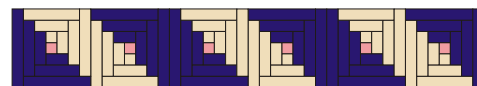
Take two of the log cabin blocks and sew them together with the darker fabric together the lighter fabric to the outside. The diagonal line of the lighter fabric going from the right to left. Figure 15. Unit 15. Make 3.

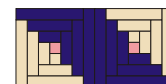
Sew the three unit 15's together to make unit 16. Figure 16. Make 2.

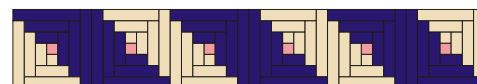
Take two of the log cabin blocks sew them together with the darker fabric together the darker fabric to the outside. The diagonal line goes from the left to the right. Figure 17. Unit 17. Make 3.

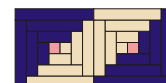
Sew the three unit 17's together to make unit 18. Figure 18. Make 3.

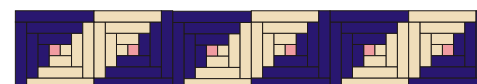
Sew two of the log cabin blocks together with the lighter fabric together, the darker fabric to the outside. The diagonal line of the lighter fabric going from the right to the left. Figure 19. Unit 19. Make 3.

Sew the three unit 19's together to make unit 20. Figure 20. Unit 20.

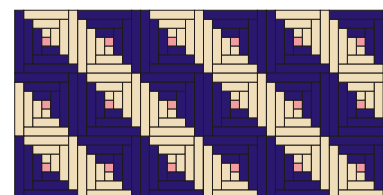

Take one of the unit 16's and add to the top of one of the unit 18's.

Add the second unit 16 to the bottom of the unit 18. Figure 21. Unit 21.

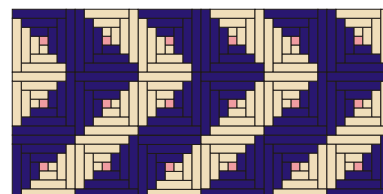

Flip one of the unit 18's 180 degrees and sew to the bottom of a second unit 18.

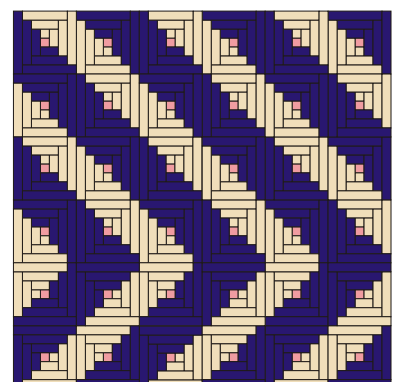
Add the unit 20 to the bottom . Figure 22. Unit 22.

Sew unit 21 to the top of unit 22 . Figure 23. Unit 23. Make 2.

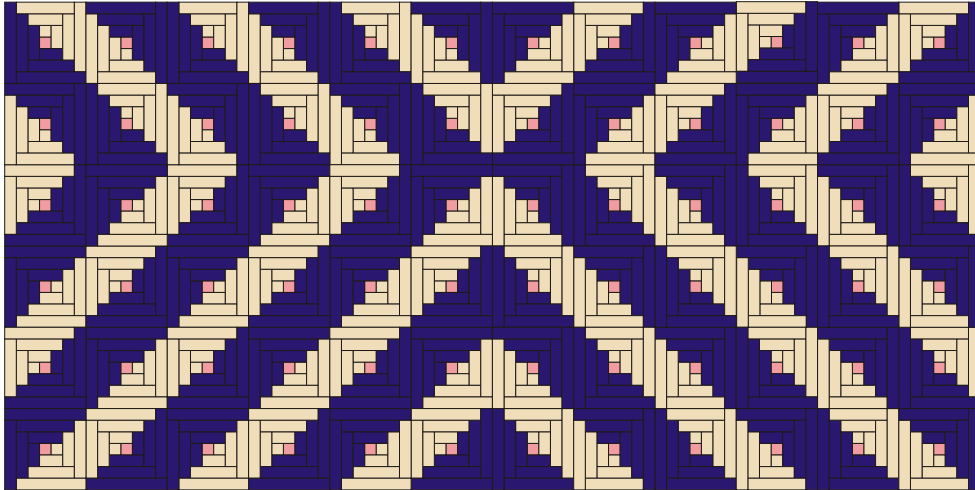


Figure 24. Unit 24.

Take one of the unit 14's , turn a unit 23 round 180° and sew the two units together. Figure 24. Unit 24.

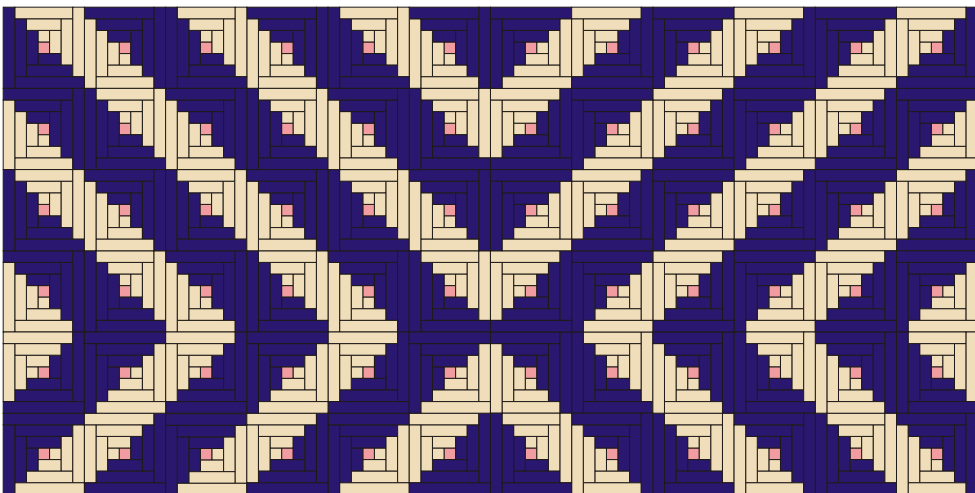


Figure 25. Unit 25.

Turn the second unit 14 180° add this to the second unit 23. To make unit 25. Figure 25.

Join unit 24 to unit 25. This finishes the centre of the quilt top. Figure 26.

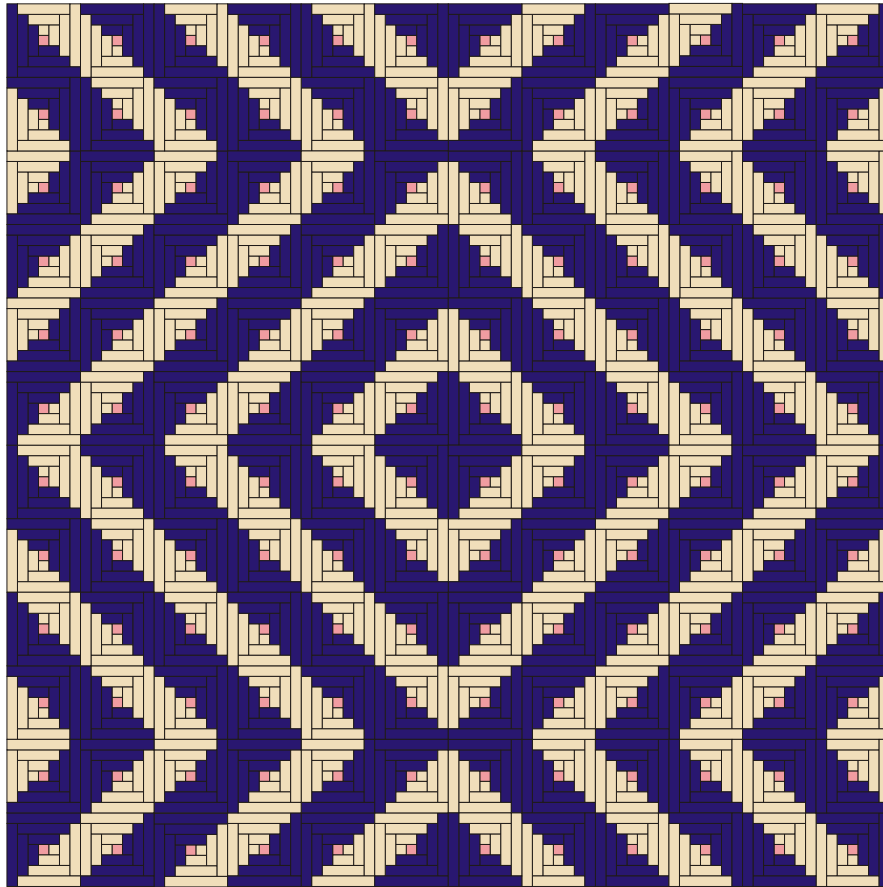


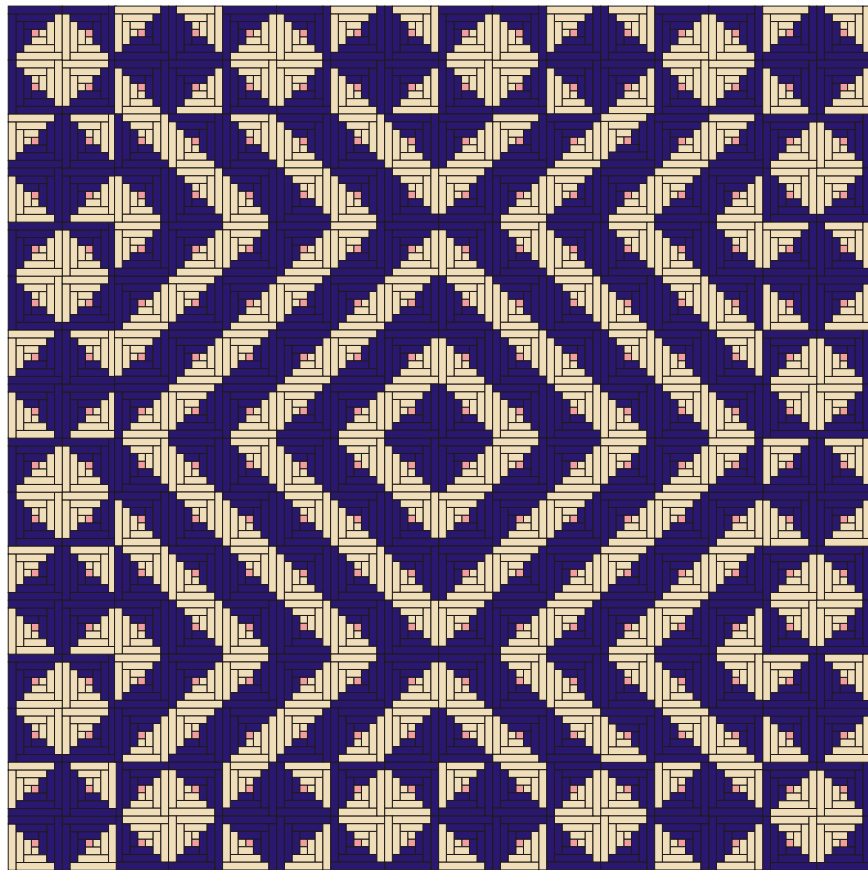

To the left of the quilt add unit 3.

To the right of the quilt add unit 4.

To the top and bottom of quilt add a unit 5. This will complete to quilt top figure 27.



The quilt can be backed and quilted and a label added.
